Abstract

This study examines attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) and callous-unemotional

(CU) traits as moderators of the association between conduct problems (CP) and young adult

functioning. Young adults (n=283; $M_{age}=20.82$ years; 53.4% female), oversampled for attention

and behavior problems, provided self-ratings of ADHD, CP, and CU, and adaptive functioning
